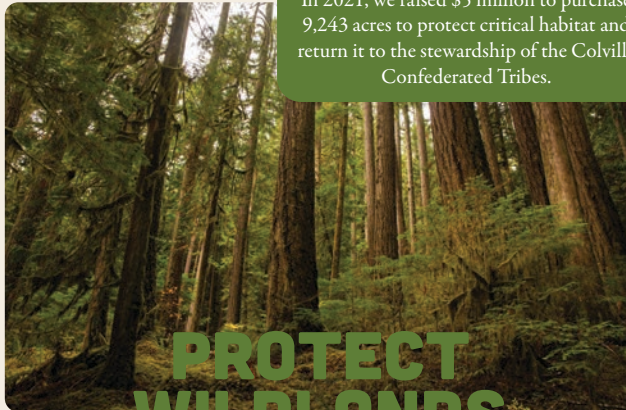


While founded in Bellingham, our main office is now headquartered in Seattle. Our staff work across Washington state and into British Columbia.



Conservation must go hand-in-hand with healthy, prosperous, and equitable communities for long-term progress. Conservationists, farmers, Indigenous and First Nations peoples, hikers and climbers, hunters and anglers—we all share a love for nature, wild animals, and careful stewardship of the natural legacy we leave for generations to come. By working together, we're building a stronger, wilder future in the Pacific Northwest!

In 2021, we raised \$5 million to purchase 9,243 acres to protect critical habitat and return it to the stewardship of the Colville Confederated Tribes.



We defend large blocks of habitat that are essential for the long-term persistence of ecosystems and native wildlife. Conserving these core areas is critical for carbon sequestration and ecological adaptation in the face of a changing climate. We engage collaboratively to ensure that projects create ecological adaptability to fire-prone forests based on science and protective of large trees, watersheds, and other baseline concerns.

Imagine a west free of barbed wire. We are piloting virtual fencing for cattle ranching. Using just GPS and an app, ranchers can set dynamic boundaries at a much lower cost.



Our most distinct work involves protecting habitat corridors that keep our Northwest ecosystem interconnected for wildlife movement. Large and linked blocks of habitat are the cornerstone of building resilience, and those linkages are often tenuous and at risk. We find innovative ways to both protect habitat within bottlenecks and gain structures that provide wildlife safe passage under or over highways.

Among other significant species, we are helping to actively restore lynx to the Kettle River Range, where they were trapped to near extinction by the 1980s.



Diverse animal species make our region rich and vibrant. Thriving wildlife populations signal and sustain healthy ecosystems. We restore and protect iconic Northwest species including wolves, lynx, fishers, pygmy rabbits, greater sage-grouse, and grizzlies.
